## Bibliographical Test: THE NEW TESTAMENT COMPARED WITH OTHER WORKS OF ANTIQUITY

## The Manuscript Comparison<sup>5</sup>:

F.F. Bruce in *The New Testament Documents* vividly pictures the comparison between the New Testament and the ancient historical writings.

As Bruce also comments in *The Books and Parchments*, "There is no body of ancient literature in the world which enjoys such a wealth of good textual attestation as the New Testament."

Historian J. Harold Greenlee rightfully concludes, "Since scholars accept as generally trustworthy the writings of the ancient classics even though the earliest MSS (handwritten copies of the Scriptures) written so long after the original writings and the number of extant MSS is in many instances so small, it is clear that the reliability of the text of the New Testament is likewise assured."

Bruce Metzger observes: "in the entire range of ancient Greek and Latin literature, the Iliad ranks next to the New Testament in possessing the greatest amount of manuscript testimony."

As Floyd McElveen has observed in God's Word, Final, Infallible and Forever,
